Aims of the Course

- To help students develop a broad knowledge
 - variety of different subject areas
- To encourage students to articulate and use arguments,
concepts and theories
 - both orally and in writing

Aims continued

- To provide students with opportunities to learn independently and in groups in order to make the most of their current and future studies

- To equip students with the interdisciplinary knowledge to navigate the community and employment sectors

Aims continued

- To provide students with the learning skills and knowledge

needed to confidently advocate for change in their own

lives and the wider disability community

- To introduce students to academic scholarship, evidence-

based interdisciplinary research and university life

Types of Assessments

- There are lots of different types of assessments on this course.

- Examples:

- Written assignments
- Reflective journal
- Group projects
- Presentations
- Exams
- Portfolios

Grading

- Fail = 39% and below
- Pass = 40%-69%
- Distinction = 70% - 100%

Our role in TCPID is to....

- Support students in understanding information

- Adapt assignments to meet learning needs of all students
- Support students to manage college life
- Present lectures in a way that students understand

Our role in TCPID is to....

- Help students develop skills for employment

- Advocate for student rights
- Support students' independence
- Treat students as responsible adults who are responsible for their own learning

Our role is not....

- Travel training students
- students should be able to make their own way to college
- Do assignments with or for students
- Students will have independent study hours in

their timetable

- Students may need support from family or keyworker in organising their work
- Speaking to parents without the student's consent or having parent-tutor meetings
- Finding employment for students

- Academic ability – completed Junior Certificate or equivalent
- Interest in course content
- Motivated to learn
- Ability to work with others

Application Process

1. Complete Application Package and send to Centre **by**

18th May to tcpid@tcd.ie (via email ONLY)

2. Applications will be reviewed by staff and shortlisted

3. Shortlisted applicants will be invited to an interview

– Interviews take place **in June (dates tbc)**

4. Successful applicants will be offered a place on the course

– Student to notify TCPID of acceptance by date specified in letter

– Students will start college in September (date TBC)

Application Package

Form A: Student Application Form

- The student application form helps us to learn more about

you.

- It gives you a chance to tell us
- what you are good at,
- why you want to do the course and
- what types of supports can help you to do well.

Application Package

Form B: Application Form for Schools

- Form B should be submitted by applicants who are in school or have left school recently (in the last 3 years).
- You should give this form to your school and ask them to send it back to you.

Application Package

- Evidence of Disability Documents

- All applicants must submit an evidence of disability document(s).

Type of documentation

- Preferred documents:
 - Report from consultant/specialist
 - Educational Psychology report
 - Individual Education Plan (IEP)
- Other documents you can submit are:

- Occupational therapy report
- Speech and language therapy report
- Physiotherapy report
- Clinical psychology report

Interview Day

- The interview day will include:
 - Individual interviews
 - Group activity
 - Assessment of the potential student's ability to interact with peers, lecturers, and administrative staff
 - Assessment of applicants ability of mathematical, literacy and computer skills
